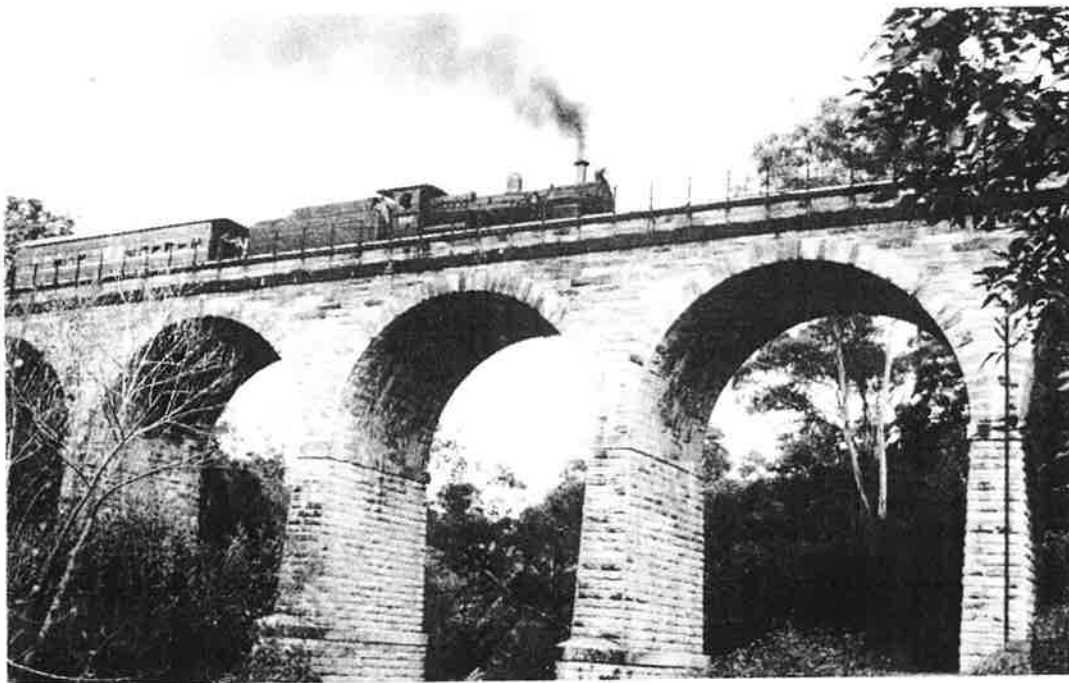

**Hanger** by:- Gail Hanger

The dream of a family historian is to a) find that elusive ancestor and to b) have the fruits of their research published and to c) experience the final moment when we see our family tree in print. So, finally after almost 17 years of researching my father's paternal line, my dream is to become a reality with a reunion and a book.

My great great grandfather Henry **Hanger** was born in Rushden, Northampton, England, the son of Henry and Ann nee Jones. Henry was a convict, transported for life to the colonies for sheep stealing at just 19 years of age. He was a shoemaker indifferent - to this day, I still don't know what an "indifferent shoemaker" is. He became a farmer with shoemaking on the side and settled in the Camden/Picton area.

Henry **Hanger** married Mary **Booling** on 3rd June 1850 at St John's Church of England, Camden.

Mary was an Irish lass from Baltinglass, Co. Wicklow, whose parents had died in the Potato Famine. She arrived in Australia on one of the Irish Orphan Ships, just 11 short months before she married Henry. With the birth of twins, John William and Alice on 23rd December 1850, followed by Elizabeth Selina, George, Mary Ann, Henry Thomas, Joseph, Jane and Lillian Josephine, the family soon grew to nine. All their children reached adulthood and with the exception of Jane married and raised families, so that Henry's descendants now number over a thousand.

The reunion will be held at Victoria Park, Picton on the 1st June 1997, commencing at 10 a.m. Bring a picnic lunch. Hot water will be available.

The lovely part about the book being published is that all of the descendants are able to have their own pocket history inserted. **EVANGELAN Publishing** will be there on the day, so bring any photos that you might like to be included.

The children and their spouses were:- John William and Annie Maris **Smith**; Alice and Alexander Berkeley **Campbell**; Elizabeth Selina and George **Willis**; Mary Ann and John **Willis**; Henry Thomas and Mary **Johnston**; Joseph and Eliza Swan **Larkin**; Jane remained single; Lillian Josephine and Frederick **Shoemark**.

#### Our Unsung Heroes

How many read the article compiled by Ben Sandilands and entitled "Our Unsung Heroes" which was featured in the Good Weekend (Sydney Morning Herald) on 25 January 1997? Of the forty people listed two had links with Picton. They were Ida Cottrell and Henry Colden Antill Harrison.

#### Ida Cottrell (1882-1957)

Confined to a wheelchair by polio, Cottrell became a world-famous writer. Her first book, The Singing Gold, published in 1929, was drawn from her life at Picton in N.S.W., on the Darling Downs and in Western Queensland, where she trained cattle dogs to pull around her wheelchair.

Interestingly, a Mr Cottrell was at one stage the editor of "The Picton Argus" which ceased publication in May 1896 (Picton Post - 16 April 1924). Furthermore, a Catherine Cottrell married an Edward Robert Webb in Sydney in 1896 (Federation Index). Edward Frederick Webb who married Sarah Mary Bateup of Picton was the proprietor of "The Picton Argus" during the late 1880s. (Picton Argus - 13 February 1886)

According to the relevant entry in the Australian Dictionary of Biography (Barbara Ross and Martha Rutledge) the writer's husband, Walter Mackenzie Cottrell was a book-keeper on Ularunda which was a property near Morven in Queensland and was owned by a "Fletcher uncle".

Were these connections merely coincidental or is there more to the story? Does anybody know?

### Henry Colden Antill Harrison

The father of Australian Rules Football. Harrison was famous as an amateur foot racer when he joined Melbourne's football club in 1858. The Victorian clubs evolved new rules which Harrison drafted into a code which included marking. His actions had a profound effect on the future shape of Australian sport. Harrison House, the Melbourne headquarters of the AFL, commemorates his name.

### Henry Colden Antill Harrison

H.C.A. Harrison was born on 16 October 1836 at Jarvisfield, the property of his uncle, Major Henry Colden Antill, near Picton, N.S.W., son of John Harrison and his wife Jane, nee Howe, a relative of William Redfern, Thomas Reiby, George Howe and H.S. Willis. . .

It had been earlier serialised in the American Ladies Home Journal which paid \$US5,000 for the rights. Because most of this would have disappeared in taxes if she'd stayed in Australia, Cottrell sailed for California. She continued to write about the bush in her epic novel Earth Battle (1938). She'd lived a vagabond life in the outback in her earlier years with husband Walter, who travelled with her and two dogs in a truck (when they weren't in residence at the People's Palace lodging house in Sydney). Cottrell learned to drive, swim, row and shoot, greatly offending society's view of how cripples should conduct themselves. This lifestyle continued in the US, where the couple became citizens in 1939, settling in Florida in 1942.

Ida Cottrell

Ida's (Dorothy/Dossie) parents were Walter Barwon Wilkinson who was a mining engineer and Ida Constance Fletcher who lived at Denfield Villa which is now considered to be in Tahmoor. However, when Ida Constance and Walter married in 1900, Denfield Villa was said to be at Bargo. Following their marriage in Sydney, Walter and Ida travelled to Charters Towers where Walter was working. (Picton Post and Advocate - 19 September 1900)

In 1897 there was a female journalist who wrote for the "Picton Advocate". Although it is only conjecture on my part, I suspect that this person was Mrs Alma McQuiggin, wife of the first Mayor of Picton. The following comment was published at the same time that it was revealed that the author of the column entitled "Topical Notes" was a woman.

"Can you inform me, dear me dear reader, who the would-be author is that resides in Picton, and at the present time is supposed to be writing a book, taking for **her** characters individual residents in Picton. Perhaps the author when the book is finished, will allow me to purchase the copyright."

Who was the writer of "The Picton Advocate's" column referring to, because Ida Dorothy Ottley Cottrell (nee Wilkinson) was not born until 1902.
