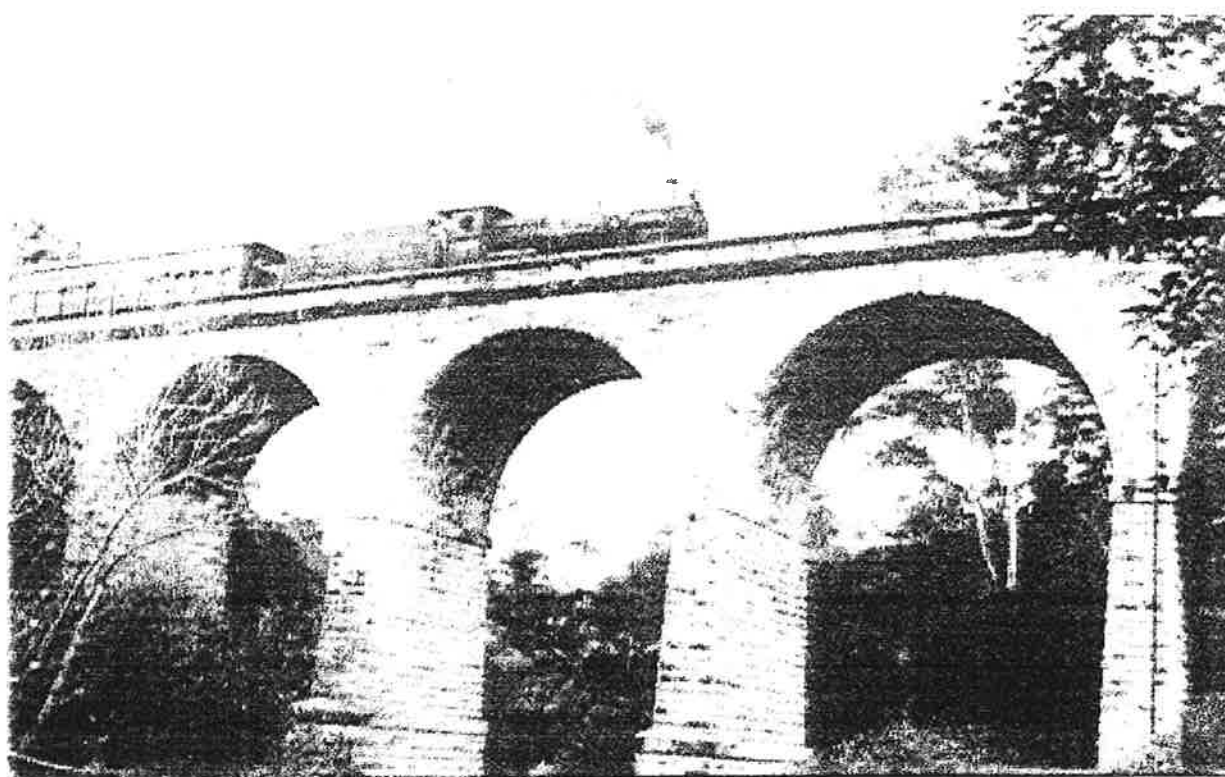

Outcasts, or On the Other Side. By Jan Ross.

It all started with an enquiry from Ireland. An elderly lady wanted to find out the exact location of the burial site of her grandfather. He died from tuberculosis and was interred in the Upper Picton Cemetery in 1878.

The enquiry was readily answered because the Picton and District Historical and Family History Society has in its possession a number of original INTERMENT REGISTERS which were initially maintained by the trustees of the cemetery and subsequently by the local undertakers.

As I checked the relevant register I noticed that on the reverse side of some loose sheets of paper there was a list of dates bearing the notation of "PATIENT IN HOME" alongside each entry. There were no names but when I compared the information with a microfilm copy of ST MARKS CHURCH OF ENGLAND BURIAL REGISTERS (SAG196) I was confronted with an entirely new avenue of research. Matching the dates, the names of each patient was revealed.

Having already documented the history of Picton's Queen Victoria Memorial Hospital I had foolishly thought that I had investigated all associated activities. TUT! TUT!

QUEEN VICTORIA HOSPITAL at PICTON was constructed in 1886. It was the first permanent institution in Australia to be built specifically for people suffering from Consumption (tuberculosis). Prior to this John Hay GOODLET who was a Sydney Philanthropist (GOODLET & SMITH) had in 1877, established FLORENCE VILLA, a HOME for CONSUMPTIVES (Tuberculosis) in a building which initially had been erected an hotel (1997- IMPERIAL HOTEL, in PICTON).

Goodlet built the hospital on his own property "HARMONY" and personally funded it until 1893 when his investments were affected by the depressed conditions of the 1890's. The hospital was given to the QUEEN VICTORIA HOMES FOR CONSUMPTIVES FUND in 1905 and while it still stands today, its name has been changed to "QUEEN VICTORIA MEMORIAL HOME".

During the institution's earlier years when it functioned solely as a home for consumptives (sanatorium) many of its patients never recovered and therefore did not return to their loved ones. They were buried in local cemeteries or graveyards.

Of the innumerable burial sites very few have headstones. Several of the hospital's patients had come to Australia hoping that the climatic conditions would assist with their recovery. They died a lonely death separated from their families. Furthermore, the nineteenth century attitude to TUBERCULOSIS or WHITE PLAGUE as it was commonly known, was not dissimilar to today's behaviour towards AID'S sufferers.

**More about the Buckley Sawmill at Maldon and Picton.
From Chilla Buckley and Jack O'Prey.**

The Buckley's sawmill was moved from Maldon to Picton about 1928. And no further firewood orders were sent to the Sydney area. Mr Ted Buckley Snr did sawing at the mill on the new site. The new site of the mill was in the vicinity of 131 Menangle Street, near a hollow and an un-named watercourse. Charlie Jessup and family lived nearby in a house at the back of the mill.

As the bush logs were sawn into bread bakers wood of 36" long, and household blocks of 12" long, they slid down a bank and fell into a cart standing below. The horse drawn cart would then leave to make local deliveries.

Occasionally when the mill needed more logs. Ted Jnr, and Jack went out with the horses and carts, cutting and loading bulk deadwood. If the deadwood was on the side of a hill, the longer and heavier logs were chained together and tied underneath the loaded cart, this way they were virtually pulled down the hill, this helped to hold the cart from doing a bolt down the hill. After the loaded cart had been taken to the mill and unloaded, Ted and Jack went back and loaded up the logs that had been dragged down.

The hills and flats had been cleared for farming and crops in earlier years and much dead wood was lying around Picton, Razorback, Abbotsford and Tahmoor.

The sawmill shopping list for the wood was Ironbark, Box tree, Eucalyptus. Stringy Bark, Spotted Gum, Red Gum and Oak tree. Ironbark and Oak tree were the dearest and Spotted gum the cheapest. Bread bakers bought Oak tree for more heat and longer lasting hot ash. The Oak tree wood came from around Stonequarry and Racecourse creeks.

The sawmill bench was powered by a mounted steam engine similar to a steam road roller (traction engine) which had a large flywheel and a wide leather belt back to the saw bench.

The Buckley's Menangle Street sawmill closed about 1935 as Mr Ted Buckley Senior was experiencing ill health. Cleary Bros bought the mill equipment and took it to Douglas Park, added to it and used it for dredging sand from the Nepean River. Cleary Bros used the suction method for dredging the sand from the river bed.

For the sake of history, at the same time at Picton, there was a Tritton's sawmill and log mill almost opposite, in the vicinity of 156 Menangle Street. for about five years when Mr Perc Brooks and family bought the property and surrounding acreage and commenced a dairy farm.

AUG. 30, 1873.

The Farm at Windmill Hill.

The windmill, from which the farm takes its name, stands close to the house, but has not been used for grinding purposes for some years, being occupied at present only as a store; and as the cultivation of wheat seems to be quite given up by the farmers of Cumberland, I question whether the sails will again be called upon to do their whilom office. There's a sort of general look about the farm which says very plainly "here we have everything of the best;" poultry, pigs, horses, cattle, dogs, all well selected, well housed and well fed; and if that is the aspect of the outside surroundings, it is equally so within the house, where true hospitality and a hearty old English welcome reign supreme, and the only anxiety is, lest the guest, be he old friend or casual acquaintance, should not make himself at home. Such was my experience when I accepted last week a long since given invitation, and found myself under the comfortable roof trees of Mr. Larkin; my kind host having met me at the Campbelltown station, and driven me the twelve miles home from thence in his buggy. The road was very fair going, and old "Chummy" took us along at a very fair pace, notwithstanding he may sometimes be lightly spoken of on account of his age and consequent infirmities. Traveling along between Campbelltown and Appin, past Mr. Woodhouse's, of Mount Gilead, Mr. Clayton's, and other properties, one comes to many pretty views and bits of scenery along the railway line to the west, and across it down to Camden; and near to Appin, is passed the spot picked out by Sir Thomas Mitchell as the highest in the County of Cumberland. There is, in fact, plenty of the romantic to be seen in the neighbourhood, and my great regret was that I couldn't stay two or three days longer and see more of the country. My objects on the present occasion were twofold,—business of course coming first, and that was to see the live stock at Windmill Hill, of which I'm going to tell you, and then pleasure, to enjoy myself for a day or two, the which I did right well. Of the live stock the Lincoln horse Honest Tom is the principal feature, as by the way, he would be anywhere else, I should think; seeing that, to please me, I've not seen one of his class equal to him in the colony; and one great beauty of him is that he's improving steadily, as I judge from seeing him at longish intervals. For instance, I first made acquaintance with him when he was quarantined at Dawes' Point, under the battery; and took a great fancy to him on account of his capital limbs, good bone, great joints, and strength combined with activity. Next time he came under my notice was at the show, in April last, when I noticed immense improvement in him, and was glad to see that the opinion I had formed of him when first he landed, was endorsed by the judges, who gave him a couple of blue ribbons to carry home, and make the main street of lively Appin to wear a still more joyous look than is its wont. He had then grown into a great horse indeed, was much thicker than when first I saw him; and I think he created more sensation, and was more talked about than any other horse in the Show; for as a matter of fact "The Lincoln horse" was in everybody's mouth. Another interval—this time of four months—and I have once more interviewed my old friend Honest Tom; and once more I have to notice great improvement. He has now lost his coltish appearance, and put on the look of a great cart horse caste; and I dare to say there's not one in the country that will better stand the test of pulling to pieces. He has tremendous strength behind, loins, thighs, and quarters, such as are not met with every day; and he's got as grand a pair of hocks as ever I'd wish to see, with muscle running right down into them. His back is wonderfully short, he's round in the barrel, good in the waist, capital shoulder and chest,

with great thickness through; has fine muscular arms, and big knees, and a good head and neck well set on, which he knows how to carry for himself; and when I add that I like his dappled bay colour, and the way his legs are feathered, I have, I think, given a pretty truthful verbal picture of Honest Tom. Mr. Larkin talks of travelling him through the Camden and Menangle districts for the season, which I certainly advised him all I could not to do, as I consider such a horse too valuable to run any risk with; and if he were mine he should stay at home, where he'd have no change of water to set him wrong. He's in great condition now; and the breeders of draught stock round those parts should consider themselves very lucky to have him to send to, without being brought to their doors.

His shipmate, Lady Lincoln, who also took a blue riband at the last show, is a very fine mare, lengthy, with lots of room, and just the sort to mate with Tom; and one reason why I'm particularly fond of the pair is, that they are so wonderfully good tempered, which after all is one of the cardinal virtues in all animals from men to mice. The compactness of Honest Tom, and the length and loose make of Lady Lincoln ought between them to produce something very good, as I believe they will. The horse and mare are just about the same height—16.2. Besides these two celebrities from the fens of Lincolnshire, Mr. Larkin has a few mares of good useful stamp, with which he will commence the formation of a nice little stud of medium draught stock, a description likely to become more and more saleable year by year as the formation of railways throughout the colony will call for the assistance of a large number of active horses of not too great size and weight. Of horned cattle, I saw an imported pure bred Alderney cow, very good looking; and also a bull—the one that had the ring pulled out of his nose, as he was being brought to the Metropolitan Show a couple of years since; and he is being crossed with a few nice quality well bred cows of the Shorthorn and Ayrshire types. This bull is of great size for an Alderney, but with all the character about his beautiful head, and fallow-deer's muzzle; and his calves, of which I saw several, take after him completely; one heifer especially having all the appearance and light yellow colour of a pure bred. Mr. Larkin fancies, and I think he's right, that this cross is likely to produce a valuable breed of dairy cattle; and they should be (as no doubt they will) much sought after in the butter making districts of the south coast. And all this time I've said nothing about Rover. Well, if I have left him late in the day to tell of, it's not because I didn't think of him sooner. Rover, then, is the beautiful liver and white Spaniel, who took first prize in his class at the last show; and I'm sure it will be allowed by every one that he richly deserved it. He has as fine a pair of ears as one could wish for, as good a coat and skin as I ever saw; and is beautifully feathered every where, besides having good legs and feet, a well-shaped intelligent head and kind eye, which well bespeak his nature. Rover made great friends with me, and I may say he's a general favourite. He's English by descent, though a native of the colony, sire and dam being imported; but so far he's the last of his race, not having a relation left in the land of his birth, or else I think I should try and make interest for one.
