President's Report - Gail Hanger

Hello to you all, and I hope you had a peaceful and happy Christmas, and that 2015 started well.

Once again I attended the Picton High School Awards night, and presented the John Ruffell's Prize for History to Kneli McAlister; it was a very pleasant evening.

Many thanks to Caroline and her husband Andrew for our Christmas lunch and meeting. A great time was had by all, especially as we received the news that we would get the grant to publish our book on World War I, titled *Wollondilly's Fallen – The men of Wollondilly Shire who gave their lives in the Great War*. We are in the process of completing the book and hope to have it ready for Anzac Day.

The N.S.W. & A.C.T. Association of Family History Societies Inc. are holding their 2016 conference at Camden, and we offered to give some assistance – we are too small a society to host the conference ourselves. At the moment Helen and I are attending preliminary meetings at Camden, and our small role will be made clearer in the future.

Editor's note: Apologies for the more than usual number of mistakes, and that this journal is rather late, it has been a struggle to get the book finished in time to be available for the celebrations on 18th April, and for Anzac Day itself. Fortunately the book is ready in time – see p.9-10

Continuing the notes on "Old Picton" article in the *Picton Post* in 1930.

I was very pleased to get a note from one of our members, Mrs. Margeurite Harvey, about the **Creamer** family, mentioned at the end of the article in the last journal. She was able to say that the **Emma** who married Joseph Viles was the child of John and Hanna Creamer, and so a sister to the Mary Ann mentioned. Emma Viles nee Creamer was Margeurite's great-grandmother. It is great to have these family connections within our membership. It is so encouraging to get these responses, so please do let us know if you have any connection to, or knowledge of the people we write about here. (And apologies, I missed an errant "it" in that paragraph.)

Also, I have just learned from a long-time resident who lived in Coull Street as a child, that according to the old-timers, **Mr. Coull** was very Scottish and pronounced his name "Cowell", explaining the spelling in the original article. As a newcomer to the area I had only heard the name pronounced as in "cool", and will now have to get used to this new pronunciation.

The only **Dietrich** we have any family information about is **Franz (Francis) Carl**, (1827-1910) born in Eltviole Arnt, Nassau, Germany who married **Dorothea Elizabeth Potz** (1821-?) in 1850. They are probably the Dorothea and Franz C. **Diederich** who arrived on the *San Francisco* in 1852, aged 30 and 25 respectively which matches the birth dates we have. They had at least six children, Albert born 1854, Francis born 1855, and James, 1856 or 1857, possibly born in the Camden area.

They had moved to Jarvisfield, Picton by 1859 when Christina A. was born, and then to West Bargo, or what became Tahmoor when the last two girls, Annie/Hannah and Mary were born in 1862 and 1864. Franz is described as a farmer and took up Portions 232, 236, 237 and 239 on the east side of the then Great South Road and divided by Rockford and Stratford Roads. With only a small frontage to the main road, it seems he looked after a part of it on what is now the southern edge of Tahmoor.



While I haven't yet found out when Dorothea Dietrich died, Franz /Francis is buried in the Upper Picton Cemetery, Anglican section, beside his three daughters: Annie who died young in 1870, Mary (1864-1935) and Christina (1859-1925) who had married **Richard Carter** in 1885, and he died in 1926; also one of his sons James (1857-1924).

Old **John Bateup** (1835-1907) was a carrier/labourer/driver, as well as vergger and sexton at St. Mark's Anglican Church, Picton. He was born in Surrey, England but was in Picton by 1860, married **Janete Reeves** (1842-1896) in 1862, and they had eleven children. The Bateup family was quite substantial, as John's parents **Samuel and Mary** came out with six children on the *Golconda*, arriving in 1858, though it seems that Mary died at sea. John seems to have come out separately. Samuel died at Abbotsford in 1874; one daughter Emma married **Isaac Sant**, her brother married **Jane Brookes** and Samuel junior married **Alice Burgess** – all old and/or well established families in the district. Samuel junior also lived at Abbotsford, but after his father's death moved to Island Park, which may be part of the original Stargard grant to Carl Rumker in 1822, which is on the south side of Stonequarry Creek, in Picton. Henry James owned the land, and leased it to Samuel.

The **Maxwell** reference is a bit more challenging, as the only family we have much information about is that of **John Joseph Maxwell**, a farmer in the Burraborang Valley from at least 1859, first leasing, and then by 1884 he had bought land in the Bimlow area of the Valley. He was born in Sydney in 1832, died in the Valley in 1912, and may have been a bit old for racing in the late 1880s – presumably foot racing. His sons, Thomas born 1863, Michael born 1872 and John Cornelius, born 1875 could have been runners. Thomas may be more likely, if competing against **William Pritchard** who was born in 1857 in Wales, arrived in New South Wales in 1880 on the *Camperdown* aged 23 and his occupation was bricklayer. He was living in Picton by 1884 if not earlier. William certainly left his mark on Picton as a builder – the old CBC (later NAB) bank, which has been empty for some years, the Creamery near Victoria Bridge which only operated a few years and then became a private residence, the water reservoir on top of Picton, or Reservoir Hill (built while he was a member of the Picton Council). He is thought to have built the fine brick and slate roofed houses at 42, 49, 53 and 55 Argyle Street, built for William Apps possibly in 1890 – and he lived in one of them-Hillside, No. 53 Argyle-street (later used as a private hospital for many years). He married Matilda Quinn in 1891 and they had three children, one of whom died young, soon followed by her mother, in 1895. He then married Amy Mann in 1900 and they had two boys. He returned to Wales in January 1904, but unfortunately there are few details recorded about his farewell dinner. His house contents and also material from his business (in Menangle Street West) were advertised for sale on January 6, 1904. He died in 1913, but no local obituary was printed, just a copy from his home town, with no mention of his Australian life. William deserves a longer biography, and one of our members is working on that now.

The sports grounds are a bit more of a problem, but it may have been at the back of the George Inn, which started out with 18 acres to hold horse paddocks as well as gardens and orchards. After the railway came to Picton in 1863, and then to Mittagong by 1867, coach travel dropped off, and all the land needed for horse transport might have been put to other uses. As there was a cycle track there, it may well have been used for other activities. The reference to later grounds near the Stonequarry (Railway) Viaduct probably means Victoria Park, which came into use around 1902. The showgrounds may refer to what is now Hume Oval, but we would be very happy to have any further information about the various recreation grounds of Picton. There was a combined Picton-Camden show in the 1880s which lasted a few years; the Picton A.H. & I. Show was established in 1935.

A DOGTAG
by Ken Williams

While clearing an accumulation of years of hoarding from a home, a World War Two (WW2) identity disc was found in a box containing some old pieces of meccano. They were known as a dogtag, due to its resemblance to the tag attached to a dog's collar. It read:

98610
GWYN RM
WAAAF
RC

98610 is the service number; GWYN, the surname; RM initials of given names; WAAAF is Womens Auxiliary Australian Air Force and RC is Roman Catholic.

A check of the online WW2 Nominal Roll revealed it belonged to **Rosa May GWYN**, and the details pertinent to research were her date of birth being 8th April 1922, place of birth Queanbeyan NSW, locality on enlistment was Picton NSW and her next of kin was **GEORGE BOLLARD**. Thanks to the amount of information on the web these days, it was a simple matter of finding out the remainder of who Rosa became and what happened to her, which will be addressed later, but the next of kin belonging to the Picton family of Bollard meant some further research was necessary to establish the relationship.

Luckily, two male **GWYN**'s had enlisted at Picton, being **Thomas** born 4 February 1922, though this was proved later is a typographical error, born Bungendore, NSW who gave his next of kin as **Alma BOLLARD**, and **Arthur Beresford** born 12 February 1924 also at Bungendore, whose next of kin was **Alma GWYN**. A check of the New South Wales on line indices of Birth, Deaths and Marriages found the following.

1. **Alma Josephine GWYN** born 1917 (registered Bungendore No. 36534) parents Beresford L and Harriett (as spelt)
2. **Arthur Beresford GWYN** died 1979 (registered No. 200400, with no district shown) parents Beresford and May.
3. **Beresford Leonard GWYN** married Harriet I. M. BURTON (registered Bungendore No. 6564) in 1917
4. **Beresford Leonard GWYN** died 1940 (registered Cobar NSW No. 4602)
5. **Harriet Isabella GWYN** died 1936 (registered Wyong NSW No. 3653).
6. **George James BOLLARD** married **Alma Josephine GWYN** on 17 January 1937 at Appin NSW St. Bede's R.C. Church (registered Picton No. 1436)
7. **George James BOLLARD** born 13 March 1912 (registered Picton No.8805) parents **George Augustus BOLLARD** and **Eva Alice BOLLARD**.

The circle was finally closed. Alma, Thomas, Arthur Beresford and Rosa May were siblings, their parents had died prior to Rosa May, Thomas and Arthur Beresford's enlistment and these three had moved to Picton at some point in time after their parent's deaths or post Alma's marriage to George Bollard. As both the Gwyn parents had died by 1940, Alma Bollard would be their closest relative, and thus was listed as the next of kin.

Back to **Rosa May** and the dogtag. **Rosa May GWYN** married **Arthur Edward HOWARD** in 1947 (registered Paddington NSW No. 8531). Her death is recorded on a Sydney Suburb funeral parlour website as occurring on 21 February 2012, date of birth being 8 April 1922, which corresponds with her birth date on the WW2 Nominal Roll.

The question remains as to how did the identity disc get into a box of miscellaneous items and not found for 72 years. George and Alma lived in Argyle Street, Picton after their marriage, but George had grown up on his father's farm named "Stargard". It was 100 acres and fronted the former Oaks Road [now Barker's Lodge Road] and backed on to Stonequarry Creek. He may have had Meccano as a child and when Rosa returned after her discharge from the WAAAF, the dogtag was misplaced. The farm has long since been sub-divided and the house no longer remains, so maybe a clearance sale was held or the box given away.

To round out some family history. George and Alma had two children, Margaret Rosa and Colleen May and they divorced 8 January 1947 (State Divorce Records, case No. 68/1947). George moved to Nambour QLD where he married **Kathleen Mary (May) STAPLETON** in August 1949 and had four children of whom three survived childbirth. Pauline, Michael and Ronald. George died in 1981 in Southport QLD, hospital. Alma married **Ernest Noel CROCKETT** in 1949 (registered Boolaroo NSW No. 28491).

The original reason for conducting the research was to find any living descendants of Rosa to see if they wished to have the dogtag. The funeral parlour was contacted and they were willing to pass the information on to the person who arranged the funeral service, so I gave them my name and phone number. That is now weeks ago and no phone call, but in view of the death notice that appeared in the Sydney Morning Herald on the day after her death this is not surprising.

"SMH 22 February 2012

HOWARD Rosa May. 8 April 1922 to 21 February 2012

Much loved sister of Isabella and pre-deceased by Alma, Rita, Arthur, Thomas and June. Dearly loved aunt of Denise and Bill and their family."

No mention of a husband or children. Her only living relatives were a sister who must be in at least her middle 80's and a niece.

The Winding Ways of Research in our Archives – Helen Hanger & Kate Holmes

Helen had noticed that the house Rythdale at 222 Menangle Street, Picton was for sale in the local paper, and Kate said the house was for sale only a few years ago, so we looked up the file. We had an enquiry in 2010, asking for information about the house, said to have been built in 1907, but had very little information. Helen had some idea of the more recent residents and mentioned that a Mrs. Farrell had moved there in about 1948, and one of her sons, Ray had lived there until his marriage. For some reason this sparked Kate's interest – she knew of Ray, and his brother Ernie, having encountered them in the last fifteen or so years. So we went looking for more information in our files.

Mr. **Francis Pearce Farrell** died on November 15th, 1940 and his obituary appeared in the December 4 edition of the Picton Post & Camden Recorder:

Mr. Francis Pearce Farrell, of Brookside, Picton, who passed away after a long illness at the Camden District Hospital on November 15, was a native of the Molong district, where he was well known. He spent the early part of his life there, in the days when the late Hon. John Smith and Dr. Ross figured largely in the political life of the community, and Copper Hill was in its pristine glory as a prospective mining venture. Prophets foretold that fabulous wealth would be won from the big hill, and that the prettily situated town, a few short miles away would become the thriving centre of a big population. Unfortunately the prognostications did not come to pass. When the late Mr. Farrell left Molong he went to Parkes, then afterwards to the Hay and Wellington districts. He remained some years in each place and left behind a good name and many friends on his departure. The last 16 years of his life were spent in the Camden and Picton districts, in which he was highly respected by all who knew him. A good husband and father, his death is deeply mourned in the family circle.

The funeral took place at Camden the remains being interred in the Catholic cemetery. The Rev. M. O'Dea, P.P., conducted the service.

The late Mr. Farrell is survived by his wife and ten children. They include **Elsie** (Mrs. Bevan, Spring Creek), **Ethel** (Mrs. R. Nolan, Bob's Range) **Ida** (Mrs. T. Nolan, Orangeville), **Harriet Maude** (Mrs. B. Amey, Mount Hunter), **Frank**, **Florence** (Mrs. J. Nolan, Razorback), **Harry**, **Ernest**, **Raymond** and **Doris** of Picton.

Mrs. **Harriet Farrell** died on April 3rd, 1963, aged 79, and her obituary appeared in the Picton Post on April 11th, with more emphasis on her life in this district:

"... Mrs. Farrell, who died at her home, had been ill for some time.

She had resided in the district for over 40 years, firstly at Camden, and then at Menangle Street, Picton, for 20 years. Consequently she was known by many people.

Having a family of ten children, all living, Mrs. Farrell led a very busy life, and was also a great-grandmother.

She loved her Church and was a great worker, especially at the time of the building of the new Catholic school in Menangle St.

The late Mrs. Farrell was a keen gardener and enjoyed the many activities of home life. Before her marriage she was Miss Hayes, born at Dubbo.

Her husband, the late Francis Pearce Farrell, predeceased her by 23 years, when they were residing at Brookside, north of Picton.

The late Mrs. Farrell is survived by her ten children: **Frank** (Redbank), **Elsie** (Mrs. R. Nolan, Picton), **Ida** (Mrs. T. Nolan, Picton), **Harriet** (Mrs. B. Amey, Picton), **Florrie** (Mrs. J. Nolan, Camden), **Harry** (Macquarie Farm, Picton), **Ernie** (Picton), **Ray** (Picton), and **Doris** (Mrs. R. Small, Orangeville).

The funeral attended by a large crowd of mourners, took place at the Catholic Cemetery, Redbank, on Friday after a service at 11.30 a.m. at St. Anthony's Church, Menangle Street. The many beautiful floral tributes were testimony of the esteem in which the late Mrs. Farrell was held. We extend to the mourning family sincere sympathy in their loss.

The new Catholic school mentioned in Mrs. Farrell's obituary was opened in 1947, the small brick and tile building next to the Sheil Memorial church, opposite the Wollondilly Library. With all the recent school building, the original school is no longer used for classrooms, but the site is important as the first Catholic church was built here in 1847,

and demolished to make way for the school. There had been Catholic schools held in various places before this, as well as the public schools from the 1850s.

The eldest son of Francis and Harriet, Francis Andrew usually known as Frank, died only two years after his mother, on June 13th 1965. He was remembered in the *Picton Post* of June 17th:

A member of a well known family of Picton, Mr. Francis Andrew Farrell, of "Fernleigh", Hume Highway, died on Saturday at the age of 53 years. Mr. Farrell became seriously ill several weeks ago, but nevertheless his passing was a shock to his family and friends.

For many years Mr. Farrell had conducted a mixed farm on the picturesque hillside south of Picton, overlooking the Highway and Maldon and Wilton in the distance; he was a familiar figure in a broad brimmed hat going about his farm work and he will be greatly missed by all who knew him. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Evelyn Farrell, one daughter Marie (Mrs. Wood) and two sons, John and Laurie.

The funeral took place at the Church of England Cemetery, Redbank, after a service at 10.30 a.m. on Monday at St. Mark's Church of England. Sincere sympathy is extended to Mrs. Farrell and her family in their time of sorrow.

His son John still has the farm just outside the southern boundary of Picton.

Brookside and Macquarie Farm, mentioned in the parent's obituaries are on the Camden side of Picton, originally on the Antill family grant of Jarvisfield; Brookside on the left, and Macquarie Farm on the right of Remembrance Drive. The Picton Village Motel was built on land originally part of the latter farm, and the road giving access to the more recent subdivisions is called Governor's Road. There was a large advertisement in the *Picton Post* of January 9, 1969 for the AUCTION SALE of a MOST ATTRACTIVE DAIRY FARM, "Macquarie", of 289 acres, including a 5-roomed weatherboard cottage, dairy, hay and machinery shed. It was "Ideally situated, 50 miles from Sydney GPO, 1 miles from Picton township, on the Hume Highway."

Another ad from 1998 shows the move from dairy farm to subdivision:

Harry Farrell ran the dairy at Macquarie Farm, and we did include a short obituary of his son Ken, who worked there too, in our Journal of June 2013. Ken and his wife Vera had been active members of the Society in the 1990s before they moved away. Harry and his brother Ernie were involved in getting the golf course on Jarvisfield (now the Antill Parks course) – they are mentioned in the paper in May 1962 as being lessees of adjoining land. Ernie was married in 1936 to Kathleen Blades of Douglas Park, and built his home in Lumsdaine Street in 1938, where he lived until a few years ago. He has now moved in with his daughter who lives in Mittagong – he is 97 or 98 now. His

younger brother Ray moved to Picton Avenue after his marriage to Adaline, who sadly died in 1983. Kate would see Ray quite regularly when she was walking down to town from Lumsdaine Street via Picton Avenue, and he was coming home with his shopping already done. He has become much frailer in the last year or so, and she has missed saying hello to him on these occasions. He is now living at Durham Green, Menangle.

From World War I - the Picton Post, March 10 1915:

Welcome to Return Soldiers

The members of the Red Cross Society, Picton Branch gave a welcome to the returned soldiers from Rabaul on Tuesday evening last, 2nd March in the Protestant Hall. The Mayor being absent Ald. Nicolson welcomed the men and took them up to the stage when Miss Iceton who kindly acted as accompanist, struck up "God Save the King", the soldiers standing at the salute.

A long musical programme was gone through, but as the Chairman kept things moving the items passed all too quickly. The committee would like to thank those who so willingly helped to make the evening such a huge success. Special thanks are due to Mr. McDougall for his great help on the evening before as well as on the night of the welcome; also the school children whose patriotic songs and sabre drill added considerably to the evening's amusement.

Short speeches were given by Rev. Dill Macky, Mr. R.H. Antill, Mr. ... Privates Philip, Roberts and Colonel Lassetter.

At 10 o'clock refreshments (were offered by the ladies). As is always the case Picton people had been most generous with their donations, and there was plenty for everyone. The hall was cleared and dancing indulged in until 12 o'clock. Mrs. ...ings who agreed to play for the dancing, noticed the lights going out about midnight and struck up "God Save the King". As the last words were being sung the light failed, providing a most impressive ending to a successful and enjoyable evening.

Private Philip gave a sabre, used by the Germans on our men at Rabaul to be raffled, and Dr. Mac.... was the fortunate winner. Private Roberts gave some postage stamps he brought back with him from New Britain. They had the letters G.R.I. stamped over them, making this issue very valuable. The gifts are to be sold for the benefit of the Red Cross ... The Secretary (has the stamps, and will take) any price over the amount received at the door. Donations totaled £9.9s., less 10s. expense of the hall. Money received for the bayonet is not included.

Private Philip (or Phillips) had worked at Pickards store, and had returned from the short New Guinea campaign in January, but there are no later references to him in the Picton newspaper. Private Cecil Roberts, a railway worker, was an indefatigable letter writer – first from New Guinea, as recorded in the last journal. He then served at Gallipoli and France, returning home in 1919. We'll have more of his letters in coming journals. Colonel Lassetter was a regular army man, having served in various fields of war from the 1880s onwards. He married Elisabeth Ann Antill (1871-1927) in 1891, the daughter of John Macquarie Antill (1822-1900) and granddaughter of Major Henry Colden Antill

(1779-1852) who took up one of the first grants of land in the Picton (then Stonequarry) area. Mr. R.H. Antill mentioned in the article was Robert Henry, or Harry, (1859-1938) the older brother of Mrs. Lassetter. Mrs. Lassetter and her son Frederick were on the *Lusitania* when it was sunk, and Frederick survived the war, fighting with the British army.

Mr. MacDougall was the Clerk of Petty Sessions at the Picton court, arriving in 1914 and leaving in July 1916 when he enlisted. He died at Passchendaele in 1917, leaving a widow and one daughter (further details in the book, see below)

Wollondilly's Fallen The men of Wollondilly Shire who gave their lives in the Great War is the book that the Society has written to mark the centenary of Anzac Day. It has been researched and written by members Ken Williams, Caroline Richardson, Helen Hanger and Kate Holmes. It is 108 pages long, with fantastic colour photos for the front and back covers done by Caroline and her husband Andrew. It is priced at \$20 plus postage & handling of \$5. Overleaf is a list of the names included in the book – some only spent a short time in the Shire, others had families here for several generations. Some who were born here moved soon afterwards with their families to other parts of Australia, while others who came here for work reasons came mostly from all parts of New South Wales, and some from overseas. So there are many references to places outside the Wollondilly Shire.

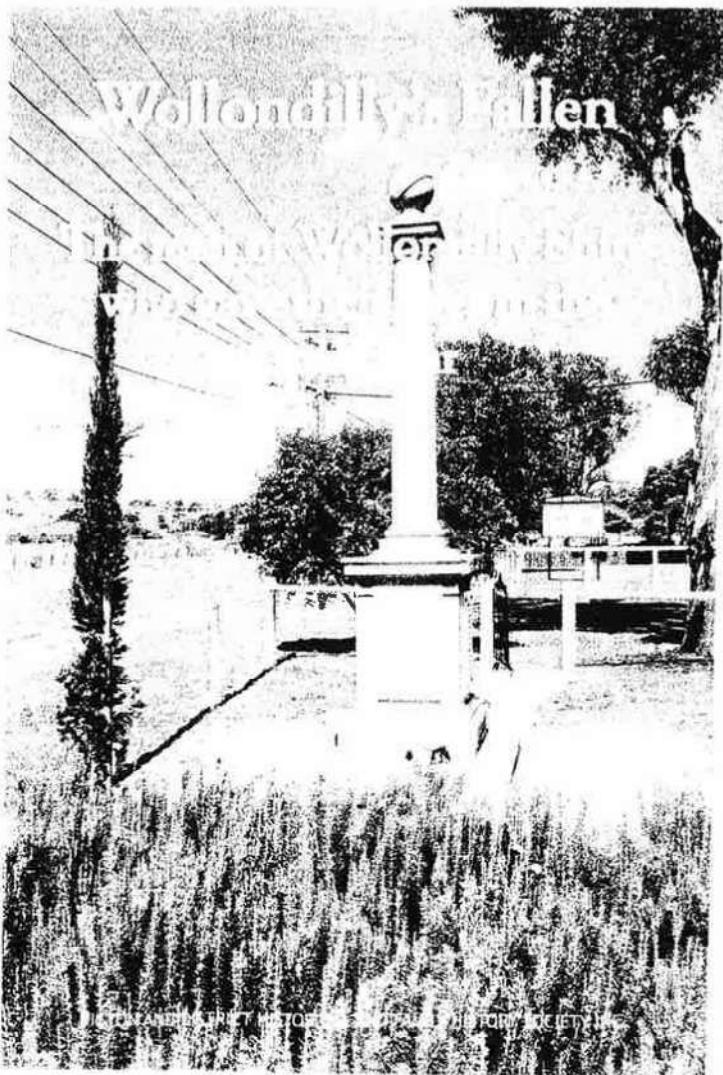

Some 98 were not identified in the 1828 Muster.
