WHY **Stonequarry Journal** ?

WHY a photograph of a **Viaduct** on the cover ?

WHY is the symbol on the society's letterhead a design depicting the **Viaduct** ?

WHY does the inscription on the northern entrance wall to the town of Picton read:

"Welcome to Picton the Stonequarry Town" ?

Picton is situated on the banks of Stonequarry Creek and was known as "Stonequarry" prior to the establishment of the present town of Picton in 1841. It was therefore appropriate that the Picton & District Historical & Family History Society named its quarterly journal, "**Stonequarry Journal**". When looking for an emblem for the society's letterhead and for a photograph for the journal cover that would best depict the Picton area, it was an obvious choice to use an image of the **Picton Railway Viaduct**. This majestic structure was built of sandstone in the early 1860's to allow steam trains to cross the **Stonequarry Creek**. It is a popular tourist attraction and an ideal picnic spot, thanks to the voluntary work done in maintaining the surrounding area by local identity, Fred Pullman.

The main article of the March quarterly journal is entitled, **Stonequarry Creek and its Environs**. It was written by Jan Ross and covers the period from the first European settlement to the present day.

SOME ADDITIONAL FACTS

Stonequarry Creek

1. In February 1804 the botanist, George Caley, followed a cattle track leading to Stonequarry Creek. Caley gave it the 'grandiose name' of "London Road", stating that it was "much travelled and an important one".

2. During his tours of New South Wales between 1810 and 1822, Governor Lachlan Macquarie travelled through the Cowpastures, camping with his party on a number of occasions on the banks of Stonequarry Creek.

STONEQUARRY CREEK and its ENVIRONS

Contemporary Picton or the Central Business District of the 1990's, virtually covers the same geographical area as "The Private Township of Picton" which was formed in August 1841. The latter site was part of land (Jervisfield) granted to Henry Colden Antill on 9 July 1822. Major Antill had been Aide-de-camp to Governor Lachlan Macquarie.

European colonisation invariably focused on a source of water and it could be said that this is one of the reasons why Australians now have to cope with the effects of flooding. Unprepared for the climatic conditions of this land, the majority of early pioneers had never experienced a flood nor a drought. In most instances settlements hugged the waterways as they had done in the "home country".

"Stonequarry Creek" was given its name by Henry Hacking in 1798. The botanist/explorer George Caley who obviously favoured botanical names referred to it as "**Poppy Brook**".

In 1788, two bulls and five cows escaped from Sydney Town. Later, a considerably enlarged herd of wild cattle were discovered in an area which became known as "the Cowpastures". Initially the colonial government's attitude had been to protect and preserve the wild cattle, thereby ensuring increased numbers. In 1817 Governor Macquarie began to make plans for the capture of the wild herd and officially the government policy became one of "capture" and "destruction".

Three government stockyards were erected in the Cowpastures, the main one being at Brownlow Hill, the second at The Oaks and the third at Stonequarry Creek, or more correctly on Racecourse Creek, a tributary of Stonequarry Creek. Most of the "wild cattle" were eventually destroyed between 1819 and 1821.

In Picton, or Stonequarry as the village had been known prior to 1841, the "Stonequarry Creek" with its associated waterways played a significant role in the pattern of the town's development. The creeks formed the boundaries of the first three European land grants of 1822. These were the estates of Jervis Field (Antill), Stargard (Rumker) and Abbotsford (Harper).

Within a year of arriving in the Colony in 1810, Captain (later Major) Henry Colden Antill had visited this area and had been very impressed with the beautiful rich countryside. It is not surprising that in retirement he chose land bordering the "Stonequarry Creek" for his permanent home.

A BICENTENNIAL PROJECT

One of the more recent innovations in the central business area of Picton was the beautification of the Village Square.

From a heritage point of view the Village Square successfully merges the new with the old as well as having converted an under utilised area into a functional meeting place.

Although the improvements to Stonequarry Creek had been mooted many years ago, it was not until 29 February 1984 that a group of community minded citizens gathered in the C.W.A. Rooms in Picton to discuss projects for Picton. The "Creek Project" had already been resurrected by Mrs Joan Brown and friends, so when it was announced that funding was available through the auspices of the New South Wales Bicentennial Council it was agreed that the project was an appropriate candidate. Much of the preliminary investigations had been conducted prior to the availability of funding becoming public knowledge.

A Wollondilly Shire Bi-centenary Steering committee had been formed in May 1983 and the Shire had been divided into four regions. Each region had four delegates and projects had to be submitted for approval to this Central Committee which was granted Charter on 29 March 1984.

While everybody in Picton agreed that the "Village Square Project" was admirable there was some dissension at other levels. The Picton submission having been approved by the New South Wales Bicentennial Council it received funding to the tune of \$70,000. A development application was lodged with the Council in November 1985.

Initially a trust was to be established. Issues of land acquisition, effluent disposal and flood liability also had to be resolved. However, because the official trust deed included a series of non-negotiable clauses which related to an individual's liability, the Picton Village Square Committee approached the Wollondilly Shire Council to act as the "promoter" of the project and the committee assumed the role of "project manager".

Furthermore, it was a requirement of the central funding body that all projects be conducted under the jurisdiction of the local government authority and therefore the Wollondilly Shire Council accepted the responsibility of administering the project.

Plans for the rotunda and the choice of building materials were discussed and selected. Quotes for earthworks and drainage, landscaping plus electrical contracts were obtained. Committee members pored over brochures depicting lampstands, signage, park furniture and plaques. Paving, brick, bush rock and timber samples were examined.

Many local firms and individuals contributed to the project either by lending machinery and equipment, by giving material free of charge or in the capacity of volunteer labour. Adjacent landholders such as Adrian Oliver plus Barbara and Bruce Eagles leased or donated small portions of their land. It was a true "community project".

Despite innumerable obstacles, construction work eventually began in July 1987 and in the first half of 1988, torrential rain and flooding damaged the creek's bank and again delayed activities. Through a grant from the Public Works Department for flood mitigation and repair work, rock gabion baskets were constructed and placed near the creek's bed. These baskets designed to counteract erosion and stabilise the bank, complied with the Wollondilly council engineer's specifications. A picnic pavilion featuring images of local scenes which were painted by Year 11 students of Picton High completes the project and a time capsule was made by George Parrington.

A big boost to the project was the donation of \$20,000 from B.P. Australia and a further cash donation of \$2,000 from Blue Circle (Maldon) added to the coffers. The builder, Alan Picaud and firms such as E. E. Emmet & Sons, Sullivans Electrical and Architectural Heritage provided services and material at greatly reduced prices. Members of the C.W.A. and the Senior Citizens Organisation especially George Parrington, supported the project throughout its entirety. Many community groups such as Soroptimist International of Macarthur and the Picton and District Historical and Family History Society contributed to the scheme.

The "official opening" of the "Picton Village Square" was on 13 November 1988, and a plaque listing the names of the members of the committee was incorporated into the rotunda. The chairman was John McCorkell; vice-chairman, John Walton; secretary, Joan Brown; minutes secretary, Marie-Louise Walton; publicity officer, Margaret Cronin; project director, Michael Cronin; project manager, Harry Hoare; committee members, Elsie Dyer, Lorna Hoare, Mary Parrington, Gary Brown and Bob Fairley (Cr); works committee, Gary Brown, Michael Cronin, Harry Hoare, John McCorkell, George Parrington and John Walton; financial advisers P. J. Hunt & Co; and the legal advisers Caldwell, Martin & Cox.

However, the "real opening" was on the occasion of the "Carols By Candlelight" just a few weeks later. Who will forget the magical scene that confronted us as we approached the "Village Square" that night? It

was a perfect summer's evening. The childrens' candles flickered in the gentle breeze, the coloured lights twinkled like stars and the simple but dignified stone church was a perfect backdrop to the newly constructed rotunda. All in attendance were proud to be a part of Picton and felt deeply grateful to the few people who had accomplished so much.

The results of the project are there for us to see. Rubbish was removed from the creek and paved walkways between the mainstreet and the carpark were constructed. The rotunda and the picnic pavilion which were designed by Harry Hoare are in sympathy with St Mark's Church and all three spires are in alignment. Trees were planted and seating plus lighting were installed in the square. Picton had a wonderful venue for social activities.

Obviously the foresight of former property holders such as Diana and John Davison must be acknowledged. As one-time owners of the Picton Hotel they had been prepared to co-operate with the Wollondilly council to transform the area into a carpark.

ENVIRONMENTAL HERITAGE ITEM.

The Macarthur Rural Lands Study, which had been prepared for the Department of Planning in 1989 listed Stonequarry Creek as an "Item of Environmental Heritage". In June 1989, the Wollondilly Shire Council requested that the Creek be removed from the list.

Consequently the Historical Society wrote to the Council questioning the request and after a spate of correspondence there was no further action. Stonequarry Creek is a protected waterway and is the very reason for Picton's existence.

VILLAGE GREEN

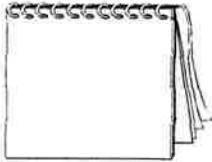
In 1994, a team of design students from the University of New South Wales suggested that the area be further enhanced. Their designs for a passive recreational area, combined with a lineal park are currently under consideration. Meanwhile, the Wollondilly Shire Council has been allocated funds from the Hawkesbury / Nepean Catchment Management Trust for the "Healing of Stonequarry Creek", a project which commenced in 1995.

THE FUTURE

Should we be surprised that every person, without fail, recognises Stonequarry Creek as the focal point of Picton? It is our childrens' heritage and our lifeline into the twenty-first century.

This district lies on both sides of the Wollondilly, embracing the north-western portion of the county of Camden, north-western portion of Westmoreland, south eastern portion of Cook, and south-western portion of Cumberland. It is purely an agricultural district, in which the grape vine is also extensively cultivated. Kerosene shale is abundant, but not yet worked. Camden: Population, 2,090 males, 1,942 females; total, 4,032. Picton: Population, 1,184 males, 1,024 females; total, 2,208. Public Houses: Camden, 6; Picton, 3. That part of the district not in the county of Cumberland is in the electoral district of Camden, with the police district of Berrima. Registered voters for the Camden electorate, 2,948. Members—A. W. Onslow, R.N., and Thomas Garrett.

Public-houses, 8. This district forms part of the Narellan electorate. Registered voters, 632. This is the Place of Petty Sessions—Campbelltown.

A small township between Campbelltown and Camden, 39 miles south of Sydney, near Camden.

POPULATION.—At the close of the year 1873 the Population of the Colony was estimated at 560,275 persons, of whom males numbered 307,329, and females 252,946. The increase in Population during the year was 21,085 souls, which is mainly due to natural increase.

MARRIAGES, BIRTHS, DEATHS.—The number of Marriages celebrated in the Colony during the year 1873 was 4,384, or nearly 8 to every 1,000 of population. The number of Births registered during the year amounted to 12,444, being an increase of 194 on the previous year. The number of each sex was 10,952 males and 10,492 females. There were 7,611 deaths recorded, or nearly 14 to every 1,000 of population. Male deaths numbered 4,599 and female, 3,012.

IMMIGRATION.—The number of arrivals from the United Kingdom during the year 1873 was 1,033, viz., 888 adults and 145 children. Of the total number only 140 were Immigrants at the public expense. The number of persons who arrived in the Colony, including Intercolonial as well as Foreign, was 24,022.
